Dear Friends of Chicago HOPES for Kids,

Chicago HOPES for Kids is fortunate to celebrate eight years of service to children in homeless shelters throughout Chicago. The ability to serve is truly a gift and would not be possible without the support and partnership of so many people and organizations in Chicago who share our concern and passion for protecting and empowering our city's most vulnerable children. Thank you to our foundation and corporate partners, AmeriCorps and VISTA members, Chicago Coalition for the Homeless, HOPES Hustlers marathon team, enrichment partners, individual donors and many others. While always keeping our eye on the ultimate goal of ending childhood homelessness altogether, it is important to recognize that there is much that we can do for children who are experiencing homelessness today. Children are resilient. We know that with the encouragement and targeted academic support provided by Chicago HOPES for Kids staff and volunteers, we can overcome the negative educational impact of homelessness. In fact, over 85% of students in HOPES after school program improve at least one reading level per semester in our program.

In 2018, we were able to reach 650 students and their families living in shelters with after school programming for students in Kindergarten through 8th grade, parent seminars, field trips and back to school supplies. We have had a strong year, but there is still a long way to go. We will continue to expand our programs and services to any family shelters in need of our support, and continuously improve our programming to serve the specific needs of our students. With your support, we look forward to continuing to empower lives through education until we reach our final goal of ending childhood homelessness altogether.

EMPOWERING LIVES THROUGH EDUCATION

Chicago HOPES for Kids has accomplished much over the past eight years, providing academic encouragement and support to over two thousand students living in Chicago shelters. We have built collaborative relationships with ten family shelters and their staff who work tirelessly to help families get back on their feet and into safe and permanent housing. Our shelter partners have welcomed us into their space because they share our commitment to mitigating the negative impact of homelessness on children's academic progress, and providing opportunities for academic growth.

We have learned much as we have grown as an organization. We have learned that homework help is not enough to enable school success for children facing the challenges of homelessness. As a result, we added targeted literacy support and enrichment activities to our programming. In 2018, we have taken our enrichment focus to the next level by engaging STEAM enrichment partners who deliver top-notch experiences to our children and inspire them to want to learn more. We delivered over 380 hours of STEAM learning with a variety of partners including Mad Science, Code Play Learn and Harmony Hope & Healing. One of our enrichment partners captured the importance of what their experiences bring to our children, "I love it so much. This a great program where we can reach a (truly) underserved group... and I am grateful for the support of the staff and the support of the volunteers. The program has worked and the kids have wanted to sing the songs and play the games and do the stories... I think these kinds of moments are transformative... and the kind of confidence it has built and the kind of community it's built... it will have lasting effects".

We have also learned the importance of engaging parents in the learning journey to support overall academic success. This past year HOPES delivered seven parent seminars on the topics of legal rights of children experiencing homelessness, specifically the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, and positive behavioral supports for children experiencing trauma. HOPES staff and AmeriCorps volunteers hosted seven field trips to various museums and attractions in the city for 185 children and their families. 2018 was also the year of our largest backpack and school supply drive to date, providing 75 children with the supplies they needed to head back to school in the fall.

We look forward to continuing our journey with the support of our amazing partners and supporters who make the work of Chicago HOPES for Kids possible.

Volunteers at the shelter where Serena is staying shared this information with me. Fortunately, we were able to add a My Little Pony series of books at Serena's level to our children's library at the shelter and suddenly reading was much more interesting. Serena's literacy level increased two levels in one program semester. Sometimes it just takes the right motivation, and of course, the right books.

As the weeks passed, he inevitably ended up bragging to his mom about how many books he's read. The best part is that the stories he read have not only been transformative in improving his literacy, but also in building his confidence both academically and socially.

Middle School Students Manage Social and Emotional Growth

The middle school group was small that we most often worked as a team. I found the moments when the students made connections with one another most memorable. In several activities, the students shared their experiences with strong emotions such as anger. While they at first had a difficult time listening to each other's comments, with practice they were able to listen more respectfully and respond meaningfully. Our site coordinators did a great job of helping them develop those social and emotional skills!

Many of the children I've met through HOPES have described the ways in which transferring schools due to housing instability has caused them to "slip through the cracks" of the school system. HOPES provides a safety net for those students by affording them the attention and support they need and deserve.
